New Features

The VERITAS File System 4.1 has the following new features and changes:

• Cross-Platform Data Sharing (CDS)

Cross-platform data sharing feature allows data to be serially shared among heterogeneous systems that have direct access to the physical devices holding the data. This feature can be used only with VERITAS Volume Manager. For more information on Cross-Platform data sharing refer to the VERITAS Storage Foundation 4.1 Cross-Platform Data Sharing Administrator's Guide.

NOTE

To use the CDS feature, an extended VxFS license is required which enables CDS.

• Multi-Volume Support (MVS)

The multi-volume support feature allows several volumes to be represented by a single logical object. All I/O to and from an underlying logical volume is directed by way of volume sets. This feature can be used only in conjunction with VERITAS Volume Manager.

The following commands are associated with MVS:

fsapadm VxFS allocation policy administration utility.

fsvoladm VxFS device administration utility.

NOTE

Full-VxVM enables the creation of Multi-Volume sets using VxVM. But a VxFS file system cannot be created on this Multi-Volume set, as it would require a separate license for enabling Multi-Volume Support on VxFS.

• Large File Systems and Large File Support

The VxFS 4.1 release is the first release to support Disk Layout Version 6. File system up to 256TB in size can be created on Disk Layout Version 6. However, file system larger than 2 TB can be created only on 64-bit kernel on VERITAS Volume Manager. A 32 TB file system requires a 2 K block size, a 64 TB file system requires a 4 K block size, and a 128

TB or larger file system requires an 8 K block size. File systems over 32 terabytes are called extra large file systems and require a license to create. However, only file system upto 32TB has been qualified and will be supported as of this stage. Also, the Online JFS license is required to create file systems over 2 TB and under 32TB. The EBFS license is required to create file systems over 32TB.

An online conversion utility vxupgrade is provided to upgrade existing disk layouts to Disk Layout Version 6 on mounted file systems.

NOTE

In this release of VxFS, file sizes can grow only up to 2 TB.

LVM, also supports creation of VxFS file system, of size, less than or equal to 2TB.

Quality of Storage Service (QoSS)

The Quality of Storage Service (QoSS) feature allows mapping of more than one device to a single file system. The QoSS feature is built on the multi-volume support technology introduced in this release. Using QoSS, policies can be configured, that automatically relocate files from one device to another, or files can be relocated using relocation commands. Having multiple devices improves performance for applications that access specific types of files. QoSS is managed using the VERITAS Enterprise Administrator (VEA) GUI, or the fssweep, fsmove and fsrpadm commands. QoSS functionality is a separately licensable feature that is available with the VRTSfspro package.

The following commands are associated with QoSS:

fsmove Relocates files to a destination component volume.

fssweep Traverses the directory structure of one or more file systems.

fsrpadm Administer relocation policies.

NOTE

To use the QoSS feature, a separate license key is required.

• Storage Checkpoint Quotas

Usage limits can be set on Storage Checkpoints. The following keywords were added to the fsckptadm command to administer Storage Checkpoints quota functionality:

getquotalimit Displays current quota limits, current usage, and flags set.

setquotalimit Sets the hard limit and soft limits for Storage Checkpoint quotas.

quotaon and

quotaoff Turns Storage Checkpoint quotas on and off.

• Storage Checkpoint File System Restore

Storage Checkpoints can be used by backup and restore applications to restore either individual files or an entire file system. Restoring from Storage Checkpoints can recover data from incorrectly modified files, but typically cannot be used to recover from hardware damage or other file system integrity problems. File system restoration can be done using the fsckpt_restore(1M) administrative command.

There is one new command associated with this feature:

fsckpt_restore VXFS Storage Checkpoint file system restoration utility.

• File Change Log

The VxFS File Change Log (FCL) tracks changes to files and directories in a file system. The File Change Log can be used by applications such as backup products, webcrawlers, search and indexing engines, and replication software that typically scan an entire file system searching for modifications since a previous scan.

The following command is associated with FCL:

fcladm VxFS File Change Log administration utility.

The following new tunable parameters are associated with FCL:

fcl_keeptime Specifies the minimum amount of time for which FCL keeps records in

the log.

 ${\tt fcl_maxalloc}$ Specifies the maximum amount of space that can be allocated to the

FCL.

fcl_winterval Specifies the interval that must elapse before the FCL records

subsequent writes to a file.

See the vxtunefs (1M) online manual page for more information on tunable parameters.

The File Change Log feature includes the following application programming interface (API) functions:

vxfs_fcl_sync Sets a synchronization point in the File Change Log.

FCL functionality is a separately licensable feature.

• Reverse Path Name Lookup

The reverse path name lookup feature uses the vxlsino command to obtain the full path name of a file or directory corresponding to an inode. Reverse path name lookup can be useful in applications, such as for clients of the VxFS File Change Log feature, in backup and restore utilities, and in replication products.

The following command is associated with the reverse name lookup:

vxlsino VxFS reverse path name lookup utility.

The reverse path name lookup feature includes the following application programming interface (API) functions:

vxfs inotopath Returns path names for a given inode number.

vxfs_inotopath_gen Returns path names for a given inode number with a specific

generation count.

• Intent Log Resize

The VxFS intent log can be resized using the log option of the fsadm command. Dynamically changing the intent log size can improve system performance. The maximum intent log size is now 2 gigabytes. For more information on intent log resizing refer to the VERITAS File System Administrator's Guide and the mkfs_vxfs(1M) and fsadm_vxfs(1M) manpages for more information on intent log size.

Named Data Streams

The named data streams feature allows the inode to be associated with multiple data streams. In VxFS 4.1, the original data stream is accessed in the same way as in the previous releases, but new data streams are referenced through a new directory inode associated with the file. The directory inode points to the new inodes, one per stream. The directory containing the named streams is not directly visible to the user.

VxFS named data stream functionality is available through the following application programming interface (API) functions:

vxfs_nattr_link Links to a named data stream.

vxfs nattr open Open a named data stream.

vxfs_nattr_rename Renames a named data stream.

vxfs nattr unlink Removes a named data stream.

Other Base-VXFS Enhancements

- The fsadm command allows fragmentation, reporting, and defragmentation operations on an individual file or directory, or on Storage Checkpoints.
- Disk layout versions prior to version 4 cannot be mounted. Use the vxfsconvert command to convert them to a disk layout version that can be mounted.
- The vxupgrade command upgrades only Disk Layout Version 4 and Disk Layout Version 5. Disk layout versions prior to version 4 cannot be mounted.
- The largefiles option is now the default file size option for the mount command and mkfs command.

End of Product Support

- The delaylog option is now the default intent logging mount option. The change of the default mount option from log to delaylog does not increase the risk of data loss, but allows Base-VxFS to cache data to improve performance. For more information on the delaylog option refer to VERITAS File System 4.1 Administrator's Guide.
- The default Storage Checkpoint creation mode is now removable.
- Operation of the intent log replay was improved to increase the speed of recovery after a file system failure.
- The histlog function was implemented in the fsdb_vxfs command. The history log records structural changes to the file system to aid in product support.
- Two new tunable parameters, inode_aging_count and inode_aging_size, for use with the Storage Checkpoint API, were added to the vxtunefs command. See the vxtunefs (1M) manual page for more information.

More VxFS functions can be performed from the VERITAS Enterprise Administrator (VEA) GUI. For more information on VEA refer to the VERITAS Enterprise Administrator (VEA 500 Series) Getting Started guide.

The vxfsu_get_ioffsets library call was renamed vxfs_get_ioffsets.

• VxFS Enhancement

The vx_ninode and vxfs_bc_bufhwm can be dynamically tuned without rebooting the machine. The changes take effect immediately, although they can be optionally made to take effect only after a reboot. For for more information on VxFS enhancements refer to the VERITAS File System 4.1 Administrator's Guide.

End of Product Support

The VxFS 4.1 release does not support the creation or mounting of file systems using the Disk Layout Version 3. However, VxFS 4.1 still provides the capability to upgrade Disk Layout Version 3 using the vxfsconvert utility, but this is the last major release to do so. HP recommends that you upgrade all older disk layouts.

HP recommends that you upgrade file systems using older disk layouts to Disk Layout Version 6. For more information on upgrading see "Compatibility With Previous Versions of VxFS" on page 16.

The QuickLog feature is not available in the VxFS 4.1 release. The multi-volume support feature replaces most of the functionality provided by QuickLog. For more information on migrating QuickLog devices to the multi-volume support function refer to the VERITAS File System 4.1 Administrator's Guide.

This is the last release to support shared (cluster) mounts on VxFS Disk Layout Version 5 cluster file systems. Upgrade all current cluster file system disk layouts to Disk Layout Version 6 to enable new VERITAS File System features and to support upgrades in future releases.

Unsupported Features

The following features are not supported in this release:

- VERITAS Quick I/O for Databases
- VERITAS QuickLog
- VERITAS FlashSnap
- Storage Checkpoints
- Cluster File Systems
- Moving VERITAS Volume Manager Volumes or VERITAS File Systems from HP-UX 11i Version 1 to HP-UX 11i Version 2 systems has not yet been tested and is not supported.

Compatibility With Previous Versions of VxFS

VxFS 4.1 file systems employ Disk Layout Version 6. With the VxFS 4.1 release, you can no longer create or mount Disk Layout Version 3 file systems. VxFS 4.1 is the last major release to support Disk Layout Version 4 and Disk Layout Version 5. HP recommends upgrading any previously installed VxFS file system to the Disk Layout Version 6 available with VxFS 4.1.

After installing Base-VxFS 4.1, you can upgrade the disk layout on mounted file systems using the vxupgrade command (see the vxupgrade (1M) manual page for details), or vxfsconvert (see the vxfsconvert (1M) manual page) to upgrade the disk layout of unmounted file systems post installation.

CAUTION

VxFS file systems must be cleanly unmounted before upgrading to the VERITAS File System 4.1 release from any previous release.

Required HP-UX Patches

For a list of the required HP-UX patches, refer to the VERITAS 4.1 Installation Guide.

NOTE

If LVM is going to be used with Disk Layout Version 6 and VxFS 4.1, the LVM patch PHCO_33308 needs to be installed. This patch provides the correct LIBC relink with LVM

If LVM is used the user needs to install the following patches as a safeguard for potential data corruption.

IVM

The default disk layout of VxFS 4.1 is version 6. When reducing a volume, LVM checks on the volume to prevent part of the existing filesystem from getting lost. Likewise, when an LVM physical volume is created, LVM checks to make sure that it is not clobbering an existing filesystem. LVM does not recognize a VxFS 4.1 filesystem with disk layout version 6. To make LVM work with Disk Layout Version 6, PHCO_33308 needs to be installed.

swapon

PHCO_33238 must be installed on the system for swapon command to enable VxFS 4.1 filesystem for paging.

WARNING

System Administration Manager (SAM) does not recognize a VxFS 4.1 file system with Disk Layout Version 6.

Software Issues in Base-VXFS

• Large File Support

VxFS 4.1 only supports files up to 2 TB on 64-bit kernels.

• Mapping a Large Offset of a File

Calling the mmap (2) function on a large offset of a file might require a large amount of swap space. If mmap (2) is called on a 1 TB offset in MAP_SHARED mode, then approximately 256 MB of virtual memory pages could be instantiated. This means that VM requires space to hold 256 MB of data structures. Each of these structures are 16 bytes, thus approximately 4 GB space is required. Since these data structures are able to be paged, more than 4 GB of swap space is reserved when mmap (2) is called.

Setting max_thread_proc Tunable

Setting max_thread_proc to a low value may result in the system being in a hung state. If the value of this tunable is less than 1100, the value will be automatically set to 1100 when VxFS is installed. This value must be maintained at or above 1100.

• DMAPI dm_get_dirattrs Can Skip Directory Entries

vx_hsm_get_dirattr() reads a directory's dirents 8 KB at a time, if the passed in user buffer is not large enough to hold the combined entries' corresponding file stats information (up to ~114kb). Then the next call to vx_hsm_get_dirattr() will continue from the wrong offset within the directory, resulting in some directory entries being skipped. HP keeps track of this defect with CR JAGaf75359.

NOTE

Note There is no error indication. The expectation is to continue from the last dirent information that could fit into the user's buffer. However, the next directory read will begin 8 KB further down the directory.

As a workaround this issue can be avoided by passing a sufficiently large user buffer.

File System With Quotas Cannot Be Mounted After Doing CDS Conversion

If a file system is using quotas, it cannot be mounted with quotas turned on after converting the byte order of the file system with the fscdsconv(1M) utility. Similarly, quotas cannot be turned on, if the converted file system is first mounted with quotas turned off. See the fscdsconv(1M) manual page for the workaround.

• CDS Validate Error Running in ja_JP.UTF-8-Encoded Locale

The fscdstask validate command returns an error when files on the specified mount point have names with ja_JP.eucJP or ja_JP.PCK encodings, but the locale has been changed to jp_JP.UTF-8. The error is as follows:

xargs: Input file is corrupt. : Incorrect byte order

Files should be created with the same locale encoding as the file system on which they reside.

Large Files Should Be Mounted Only on Systems With Sufficient Memory

When a file system is mounted, VxFS keeps certain data structures in the kernel. As the size of the file system increases, the amount of data structures stored by VxFS also increases. The file system typically keeps approximately 128 bytes per allocation unit (32,768 file system blocks). This translates to a usage of 512K per 1 TB for an 8K block size file system (4 MB per 1 TB for a 1K block size file system). Therefore, large file systems must be mounted only on systems that have sufficient memory. The memory requirements for mounting large file systems are shown in the tables below.

Software Issues in Base-VXFS

While performing a full fsck, the system keeps certain data structures in the core for validating the space usage and inode usage. The space needed depends on the number of inodes and the number of blocks in the file system. The fsck command needs approximately 16 MB per 1 TB for an 8K block size file system (128 MB per 1 TB for a 1K block size file system) and 32 MB per million inodes. Sufficient memory and swap space should be configured on the system before running a full fsck on a large file-enabled system.

A replay fsck does not need a significant amount of memory and does not have these issues.

• Some Disk Quota Operations Do Not Function on NFS

When VxFS file systems are exported via NFS, quotas on the file system apply to users when accessing the file system from NFS clients. However, the HP-UX quota commands on the NFS client cannot be used to edit quotas. The VxFS quota commands can be used on the server to edit quotas.

Files and Directories

To maximize VxFS performance, do not exceed 100,000 files in the same directory. Use multiple directories instead.

• Cross-Platform Data Sharing (CDS)

External Quota File

CDS does not support converting the external quota file. The external quota file would need to be manually migrated as follows:

On source:

Prior to unmounting the file system, remove the quotas file. Run the fscdsconv command after unmounting the file system.

On target:

Mount the file system without quotas. Manually edit the quotas and the quotas.grp file to enter the limits.

Handling ACLs with CDS

Because not all target platforms support ACLs, converting a file system with ACLs from the source to a target on which ACLs are not supported results in ACLs not being enabled on the target. If the file system is converted back to a target on which ACLs are supported, permission checks are enforced again.

Quick I/O Files Cannot Be Sparse Files

If you try to convert a sparse file to a Quick I/O file, the Oracle instance can fail if Oracle tries to write into an unallocated block. Specifically, datafiles used by the Oracle8i and Oracle9i temporary tablespace may be sparse files, so do not convert these to Quick I/O files. See the VERITAS Storage Foundation 4.1 for Oracle Database Administrator's Guide for more information.

PHCO_33308 Required for LVM Commands to Recognize Disk Layout Version 6

When reducing a volume, LVM checks the volume to prevent any part of the existing file system from being thrown away. Likewise, when an LVM physical volume is created, LVM ensures that it is not clobbering an existing file system. However, LVM does not recognize a VxFS 4.1 file system with disk layout Version 6, which is the default disk layout version in VxFS 4.1. Install PHCO 33308 for LVM to work with disk layout Version 6.

PHCO_33238 Required for swapon Command to Recognize Disk Layout Version

The swapon command does not recognize a VxFS file system with disk layout Version 6, and therefore does not produce a warning while using a device that has such a file system. Install PHCO_33238 to enhance the swapon command to recognize the VxFS disk layout Version 6.

• Applications using statvfsdev(3C) interface need to relink with new LIBC

The applications which use statvfsdev (3C) interface on a device name, need to relink with the new LIBC library, with the option =llibdlv_vxfs to be able to understand Disk Layout Version 6, available with Base-VXFS 4.1.

If the applications are not relinked, they will not be able to recognize Disk Layout Version 6 file system. However, they would continue to recognize Disk Layout Version 4 and Disk Layout Version 5 file system. The applications that are linked with the new library with the option <code>-llibdlv_vxfs</code> will work with VxFS 3.5 on HP-UX 11i version 2 without re-linking. However, the dynamic binaries need the new library on HP-UX 11i version 2 for VxFS 3.5 to work.

• System Hang Occur on Systems With Less Cache Memory

VxFS allocates a fixed amount of memory. The amount of memory allocated can be changed using the tunables vx_ninode and vx_bc_bufhwm. After long hours of operation, low-memory systems, slow down or hang due to memory pressure. To solve this problem, lower the values of vx_ninode and vx_bc_bufhwm to limit VxFS memory consumption.

NOTE

VxFS consumes a fixed percentage of memory for the default values of tunables such as vx_ninode and vx_bc_bufhwm. VxFS consumes nearly 10% of total physical memory for the default value of vx_ninode. If the

system has 512 MB of memory, VxFS will require up to 52 MB to store the VxFS inode cache. Therefore it is necessary to tune the tunables according to the type of load on the system.

Tuning Down the Inode Cache

VxFS file systems allocate and release inodes based on the file system load. Generally, larger inode caches help the file systems to perform better in case of a file server or web server load. The global tunable, vx_ninode, determines the maximum possible size of the Base-VXFS inode cache. If the default value of vx_ninode is set to zero, Base-VXFS automatically tunes the size of the inode cache at boot time, based on the size of the physical memory on the system. On systems with a RAM size of less than or equal to 1 GB per CPU, you can manually tune down vx_ninode to a value not less than that of nfile (nfile is an HP-UX tunable that represents the maximum number of file descriptors). The vxfsstat command can be used to check the current vx_ninode usage.

• Tuning Down the Buffer Cache

VxFS 4.1 implements a private buffer cache to use exclusively for metadata. The allocations to this buffer cache vary during system usage based on file system load and the maximum cache size specified in the global tunable, vxfs_bc_bufhwm. If the value of vxfs_bc_bufhwm is set to zero, VxFS automatically tunes the maximum size of the metadata buffer cache at boot time based on the system memory size. On systems with a RAM size of 1 GB per CPU or less, you can manually tune down the value of vxfs_bc_bufhwm to a minimum of 6MB.

• Full File System Cannot Be Resized

In some circumstances, the fsadm command cannot resize a 100% full file system due to lack of space for updating structural information. If a file system is busy or too fragmented, the resize operation fails.

• Data Integrity Issues with Disks and Disk Arrays with Write-back Caches

Disk drives configured to use a write-back cache, or disk arrays configured with a volatile write-back cache, exhibit data integrity problems. The problems occur after a power failure, SCSI bus reset, or other event in which the disk has cached data, but has not yet written it to non-volatile storage. A workaround for this problem is to disable the write-back cache.

• The fsadm Command Cannot Truncate a Directory

The fsadm command cannot truncate a directory if it has only one extent that is more than two blocks in length, even if all the directory entries are deleted.

• Inode Limitation on File Systems Without Large File Support

File system with 8 million inodes can be created only using the largefiles option of mkfs command (the fsadm utility can also be used to set the largefiles flag on the file system). See the mkfs_vxfs(1M) and fsadm_vxfs(1M) manpages for details.

• Some Fields Not Displayed by the fstyp Command

The fstyp -v command displays super-block information. For Disk Layout Version 4 and Disk Layout Version 5 fields such as nau, logstart or logend display zeros. For more information refer to the mkfs_vxfs (1M) and mkfs (1M) manpages.

• A Change in the Method of Computing CUT Values Cause Misleading Error Messages to Display.

In this release, the method for computing the Current Usage Table (CUT) values for a Disk Layout Version 2 file system has changed.

If a Version 2 file system is mounted on a system running VxFS 4.1, and that file system is subsequently used on an earlier version of VxFS, the following messages may display when performing a full fsck:

```
vxfs fsck: incorrect CUT entry for filset 1, fix? (ynq)
vxfs fsck: incorrect CUT entry for filset 999, fix? (ynq)
```

This is expected and does not indicate file system corruption. Answer y to both questions. There is no need to perform a full fsck when moving such a file system to and from different versions of VxFS unless the file system is dirty, in which case a full fsck is required.

• Non-standard Command Behavior When Using Access Control Lists (ACLs)

The output of the 1s -1 command on VxFS file systems shows mask /CLASS_OBJ in place of group permissions if ACLs are in use on a file or a directory. The getfacl command can be used to determine the effective group permissions.

The chmod command changes mask/CLASS_OBJ instead of the group permissions if ACLs are in use on a file or a directory. GROUP_OBJ is not changed by chmod, and because effective group permissions are determined by GROUP_OBJ and CLASS_OBJ, the default group may not receive the permissions specified by chmod. Because 1s -1 shows mask only (which is changed by chmod), it only appears that the group permissions are changed as specified in chmod. Use of chmod command is not advisable on files with ACLs. Instead, use the getfacl command to manipulate permissions.

Refer to the following manpages for ACL-related information aclcheck(3), aclsort(3), chmod(1), getfacl(1), ls(1), setfacl(1), and uname(1).

• The newfs -R Command Allows Reserving Swap Space Larger Than the Device

The newfs -R command will reserve swap space greater than is available on the underlying device.

Product Licensing

Product keys are available on the License Key certificate. The certificate also includes the number of product licenses purchased. A single key enables product installation on the number and the type of systems for which you purchased the license. A key may enable the operation of more products than specified on the certificate, but you are legally limited to the number of product licenses purchased.

The VERITAS licensing commands are provided in a software package named VRTSvlic. You must install the VRTSvlic package for the licensing process to work.

VERITAS Licensing Commands

- vxlicinst Licenses a VERITAS product already installed on a system.
- vxlicrep- View currently installed licenses.
- vxlictest- Retrieves features that are encoded in a license key along with their descriptions.

NOTE

The VRTSvlic package replaces the functionality of the VRTSlic package that was used in earlier releases. The following table lists equivalency between licensing commands in VRTSlic and VRTSvlic:
